Improving Road Network Visibility for Local Authorities

Local authorities are under growing pressure to improve visibility across their road network operations while demonstrating safety, compliance and value for money. They need better visibility into roadworks risks, contractors' performance and temporary traffic initiatives.

Greater understanding of these areas helps strengthen **roadworker safety, regulatory compliance, environmental oversight and asset protection**. It also creates consistent, evidence-backed reports that can improve public communications and budget allocations, contributing to greater stakeholder trust.



Evidence-led strategies are built around highly mobile CCTV, environmental sensors and centralised cloud platforms that provide more cohesive, flexible monitoring than static surveillance and fragmented reporting.



Why Road Network Visibility Matters More Than Ever Today

Strong oversight of critical network operations (maintenance, infrastructure upgrades, temporary traffic schemes) has always been important to delivering a safe, efficient road service and meeting regulatory and reporting requirements.

Increasingly, better intelligence has become invaluable in supporting long-term transport strategies, public accountability, legal obligations and environmental priorities. Here's why:

Increased UK Roadworks

Based on Department for Transport projections, traffic growth on England and Wales's roads could **rise by up to 54% by 2060**. Extensive works will be required to prepare the country's network and ageing infrastructure for this increased volume.



There is major concern about the challenges this buildout poses, with **62% of local highway leaders** anticipating a roadwork crisis by 2030 unless industry collaboration improves. Close oversight will be essential to manage projects on your network safely and successfully into the future.

Greater Public and Political Pressure

Since MPs and councillors must account to their constituents, they expect traffic managers to account transparently for public concerns about their roads. Local communities also demand updates and explanations for safety risks or works that affect their lives.



Without clear insights into events on the ground, you struggle to manage disruptions, verify complaints, ensure safe work practices or explain how critical incidents were handled. Public frustration at perceived incompetence can quickly escalate into social media or press attacks on your department.

Obligations Under The Highways Act 1980

Under **Section 58 of the Highways Act**, if a roads authority is sued for damages, they must prove they took reasonable care to ensure the location was not dangerous for traffic. It's only through monitoring records that you can show you were aware of a hazard and took reasonable steps to mitigate it.

Section 41 of the Act (The Duty to Maintain) requires roads to be free from dangers like potholes, obstructions and weather conditions that could endanger traffic. For both public safety and the council's legal defence, it's vital that hazards are addressed sooner rather than later.

Environmental Concerns

As the UK aims for net zero carbon emissions by 2050, there is a mounting focus on eco-friendly and sustainable work practices. Project owners need to pay attention to several environmental rules and standards: **Workplace Exposure Limits for air pollutants, noise exposure control, Control of Substances Hazardous to Health (COSHH), Control of Pollution Act 1974, and more.**



Smart tracking of noise and emission-producing activities is the only way to manage worksite environmental risks with confidence.



The Costs of Poor Visibility on Projects and Traffic Schemes

The consequences of network blind spots include delayed incident detection, legal liabilities, reputational damage and regulatory actions.



Slow network detection and response: Without continuous visibility, highways teams tend to rely on public reports or physical inspections. These methods produce delayed, unverified information that makes it harder to intercept problems, explain disruptions or show that issues are being actively managed.



Reputational harm: Ongoing safety issues and high levels of complaints raise questions about your professional competency. Having to continuously answer councillors' concerns places increased political pressure on your department, while failing to address community complaints convincingly can seriously tarnish your public reputation.



Regulatory challenges: Poor visibility into project compliance means that when HSE, environmental or council inspectors arrive on site, they might find a range of violations. This can lead to fines, investigations, further inspections and enforcement actions, including work stoppages. Increased regulatory scrutiny often causes project delays, furthering disruption and frustration.



Contractor disputes: Without firm oversight, some contractors take shortcuts and don't follow safety, security and traffic controls. When you have concrete evidence of these slipups, it's easier to engage them constructively and correct mistakes. If you rely on secondhand reports rather than solid proof, these discussions can turn into disputes while hazards go unchecked.



Operational stress and strain: Time-consuming inspections and manual processes place strain on stretched teams. Stress, and even burnout, becomes a real factor when the job seems an endless cycle of firefighting avoidable incidents, triaging complaints and excessive administration.



Weak accountability and transparency: Without an audit trail, including visual and data evidence, highways teams can't accurately verify complaints, conduct investigations and demonstrate that safety, environmental and compliance risks were effectively managed.



Legal liabilities: Failing to maintain responsible oversight may be considered a breach of your statutory duty of care. This can expose the council to costly compensation claims and legal disputes under the Highways Act 1980 (including Sections 41 and 58).



Poor information means poor decisions: Haphazard, inconsistent data collection leaves information and knowledge gaps. Leaders may base important decisions on flawed/incomplete information, taking the wrong path, with expensive consequences.

5 Challenges to Network Visibility in the UK

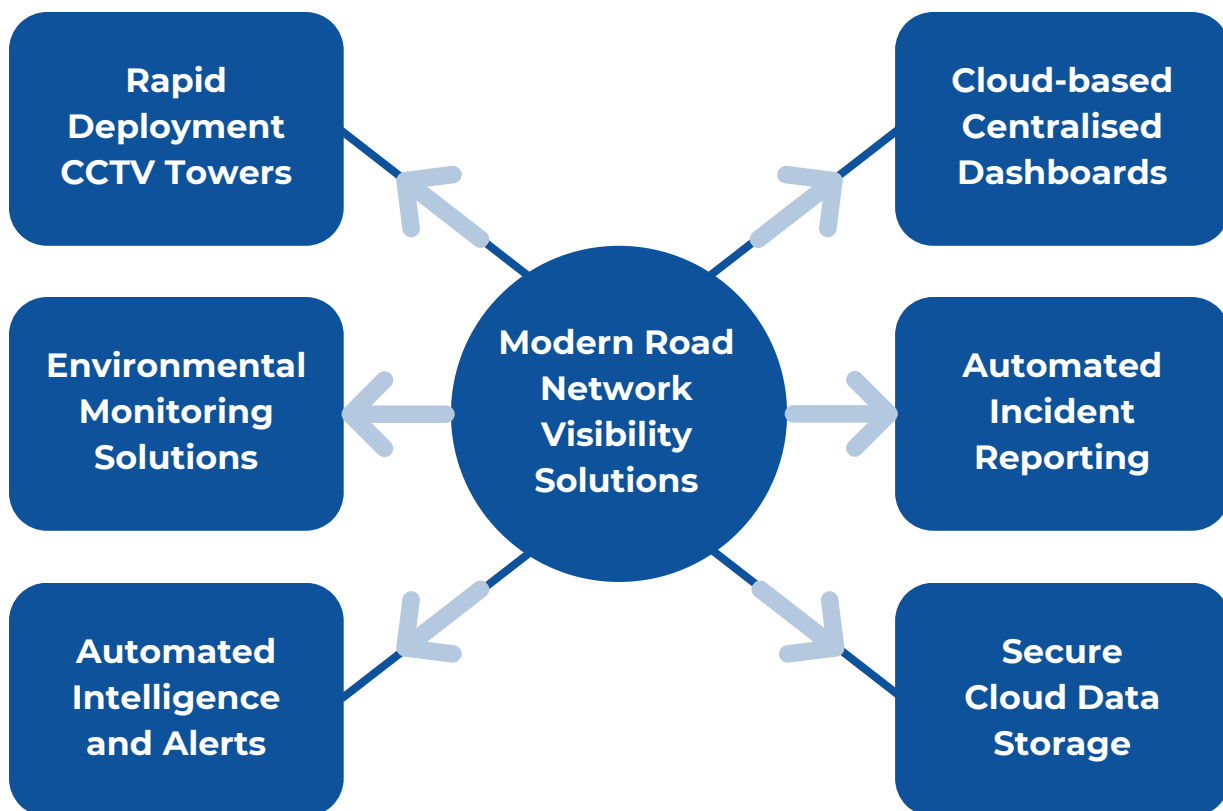

Modern network monitoring solutions feature operational technology that integrates multiple tools to provide near-360° coverage of project risks from a single smart platform. Here is a rundown of core components and capabilities:



Rapid Deployment CCTV Towers

Unlike permanent CCTV, which can take months to install, these surveillance systems can be set up in minutes. They operate independently of mains power and internet via solar/battery generation and 4G/5G connectivity. Their key advantage is quick and easy deployment to nearly any environment, from crime hotspots to remote rural road upgrades.



Environmental Monitoring Integration

Environmental tracking using IoT sensors keeps managers updated on air quality, noise levels and local weather conditions around roadworks and busy traffic projects. This real-time visibility helps local authorities and contractors identify emerging issues early while strengthening ESG, regulatory compliance and stakeholder reporting.



Automated Intelligence and Alerts

Smart systems use AI-driven analytics to filter out irrelevant background activity and immediately alert control centres and designated contacts to genuine threats. These can include security breaches, traffic incursions, fire risks, excessive noise levels and missing PPE, enabling a faster, more informed and targeted response.



Cloud-Based Centralised Dashboards

Cloud connectivity provides secure access to live and recorded video and reports via web or mobile apps, helping teams review events and respond quickly from anywhere. Cloud-Based Unified dashboards support faster, more informed decisions across safety, traffic management, theft prevention and weather risks across sites.



Automated Reporting

Auto-generated incident reports show what happened, when it happened and the corrective steps taken where relevant. Accurate, standardised reporting within the platform builds an invaluable knowledge base. The result is teams become increasingly aware of the major risks across their network and how to limit them.



Secure Cloud Data Storage

All video and documentation are housed centrally in encrypted cloud storage, reducing the risk of scattered files across local servers. Standard operating procedures: Develop operational procedures defining user responsibilities, reporting standards, incident escalations and evidence management for all projects.
